
EDUCATOR'S GUIDE DISCUSSION QUESTIONS AND ACTIVITIES FOR

The Discussion Questions and Classroom Activities in this guide are aligned with Common Core Standards for English Language Arts for grades 3-5, specifically for Reading: Literature Standards 1-3: Key Ideas and Details. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Why does Finch want to help the note writer by himself? Why does he decide to let others in on the plan? How does this change his own life? (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.1; CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.2; CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.3)

How did the kids solve David's problem with Oscar and Oliver? Was it effective? How and why? (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.1; CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.2; CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.3)

Grammy Mary's problem is solved when all the kids have their problems solved. As Finch thinks at the end, "Maybe Grammy Mary was right. If things had gone the way he wanted, it would have been just him helping just one kid. Instead, every time he had let someone in on the secret, they had turned into a helper-kid. By the end, who was a helper and who was getting helped was all mixed up. It wasn't what he had planned. It was better." Do you agree? Why? (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.1; CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.2; CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3-5.3)

Think of a time someone helped you. How did it make you feel? How do you think it made the other person feel? What about a time you helped someone else? (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.SL.3-5.4)

Digging or Digging Deep is a theme throughout the story. What are some of the types of digging going on in the story? What does it mean to dig "deeper" in each case? If you lived before people knew about dinosaurs, and you dug up a huge fossilized bone, what would you have imagined it was? (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.SL.3-5.4)

Finch is named after a famous book character (Atticus Finch from *To Kill a Mockingbird* by Harper Lee). Are you named after someone? Who? Why? What do you like best about your name? (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.SL.3-5.4)

CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES

Acrostic Name Poems

Have students brainstorm words together to create a few poems. Use either names of kids in the class, fictional characters, or famous people. Have each student write an acrostic poem using their own names. (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.SL.3-5.1)

What's Underground?

Finch thinks that "everything under the ground was like a wrapped present at a birthday party. And he was going to unwrap it." Have students brainstorm a list of some things that can be found underground. Ask students to draw pictures of some of the things they might find under their home, school, or other place in your town. (CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.SL.3-5.1)

Fake Dinosaur Names

Finch gives other characters fake dinosaur names (e.g. *Momosaurus, Awesomeraptor*) based on their human characteristics. Ask students to brainstorm some funny ideas for fake dinosaur names for themselves and their classmates. Give them some ideas to start. For instance, if someone loves to play card games, she might be Cardosaurus or Deckaraptor. If someone loves chocolate, his fake dinosaur name might be Chocoraptor or Cocoa-Rex. Once you have a good list of names, have each student pick their favorite two or three and write a small adventure story about these dinosaurs.

Edward McCarthy (page 1, 173-4, 176-7)

"On August 23,1966, fossil tracks were uncovered during excavation for a state building. When Edward McCarthy turned over a slab of gray sandstone with his bulldozer, he saw a large footprint with three toes. The news of the discovery spread quickly as more tracks were uncovered. Within a few weeks, officials decided to preserve the site as a state park. As a result of careful excavation, the park has one of the largest on-site displays of dinosaur tracks in the entire world."


